He has drafted a letter to Tilcon seeking approximately \$16,000 due to their inability to meet the contractual obligation.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE AWARD OF A ROAD RESURFACING CONTRACT THROUGH THE MORRIS COUNTY COOPERATIVE PURCHASING COUNCIL, CONTRACT #6, ROAD RESURFACING, FOR PHASE I OF THE 2006 ROAD RESURFACING PROJECT IN THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST MILFORD

WHEREAS, the Township of West Milford is a member of the Morris County Cooperative Purchasing Council; and

WHEREAS, the Morris County Cooperative Purchasing Council has awarded Contract #6, Road Resurfacing, for the 2006 year to Tilcon New York, Inc. and said contract was awarded through the open competitive bidding process and in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40a:11 et seq., Local Public Contracts Law; and

WHEREAS, the Township of West Milford has designated 3.26 miles of road in the Township as part of the 2006 Phase I road Resurfacing Project; and

WHEREAS, the Township Engineer has reviewed the Morris County Cooperative Purchasing Council's contract and related specifications and has submitted a written recommendation that the Township of West Milford award a Contract to Tilcon New York, Inc. through the Morris County Cooperative Purchasing Council, Contract #6, Road Resurfacing, in an amount not to exceed \$650,000; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer has certified as to the availability of funds for this project, said funds to be encumbered from account number C-04-05-943-624.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Township of West Milford, County of Passaic, State of New Jersey, the following:

1. The Township Council hereby awards a contract to Tilcon New York pursuant to their Contract with the Morris County Cooperative Purchasing Council contract and associated specifications in an amount not to exceed \$650,000 for the Phase I Road Resurfacing Project in the Township of West Milford.
2. The Mayor or Administrator be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a contract with Tilcon New York, Inc. in accordance with its Contract with the Morris County Cooperative Purchasing Council, contract #6, Road Resurfacing.
3. The Township's Chief Financial Officer has certified the availability of funds for same.
4. This resolution and contract shall be available for public inspection in the office of the Township Engineer.

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Administrator Kunze advised the Council that the rejection of this bid is based on the fact that the bidder failed to include a consent of surety with his bid packet.

Presentations

Council President Gervens invited members of the Historical Preservation Commission (HPC) to come forward to make their presentation.

The Commission Chairman, James Van Hooker, and Commissioner Steve Bosard stepped up to the podium and introduced themselves. They thanked the Council for supporting their grant application. They invited Wayne McCabe to come forward and advised that Mr. McCabe has been hired as a consultant as part of the grant and to guide the HPC through this process. Mr. McCabe explained that the grant that the municipality has received allows the HPC to engage services such as his for technical assistance. Through October the HPC will be offering free technical assistance to residents on how to preserve historical structures in addition to offering limited design assistance. They can visit homes and businesses to address specific site issues. They will advertise and will be holding two technical training sessions with commission members to ensure that they receive the mandatory training and to ensure that they have up-to-date knowledge. Training sessions will also be offered to the public. They plan to schedule a workshop in May to which they will invite Council members, as well as members from other commissions and committees such as the planning and zoning boards. They wish to discuss issues such as land development and how that process affects historic sites and are hoping for a Saturday meeting. Mr. McCabe asked for the Administrator's assistance is scheduling and arranging such a meeting. Mr. McCabe advised that the regulatory agency did not approve the Tichenor House for National Register designation because the building does not qualify. This rejection is primarily because of the deteriorated condition of the house. After reviewing a number of properties in Town, it is hoped that the Wallisch property would qualify for placement on the National Register of Historic Places. The HPC voted earlier this evening to pursue this and Mr. McCabe requested Council concurrence for this endeavor. Council President Gervens noted that the Township owns this property jointly with the Board of Education and thus cannot sanction any action. Mr. McCabe advised that making such an application requires a lot of work, time and effort. The deadline is September and, therefore, he needs authorization to move forward sooner rather than later. Council President Gervens advised that the subject can be broached with the Board of Education at Saturday's joint meeting. Council President Gervens thanked Mr. McCabe for his presentation tonight.

Proclamations

Council President Gervens announced that he is delighted to present two proclamations tonight on behalf of Mayor DiDonato. He approached the podium and advised that the first proclamation is for Autism Awareness Month and he invited any associated parties to join him. Mr. Tom Cibenko for the Association for Special Children and Families came forward. Council President Gervens read the following proclamation and presented it to Mr. Sybanko.

- Proclamation -

Autism Awareness Month

WHEREAS, Autism is a severely incapacitating, lifelong developmental disability, resulting in significant impairment of an individual's ability to learn, develop healthy interactive behaviors, and understand verbal, nonverbal, and reciprocal communication; and

WHEREAS, Autism is the third most common developmental disability, affecting more than 500,000 individuals nationwide, and hundreds of individuals in this state; and

WHEREAS, Autism is the result of a neurological disorder affecting the functioning of the brain, but few members of the general public understand this complex syndrome; and

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WHEREAS, although a cure for Autism has not been found, persons with Autism can be helped to reach their greatest potential. Accurate, early diagnosis and the resulting appropriate education and intervention are vital to the future growth and development of the individual; and

WHEREAS, support groups, such as "Walk Far For NAAR" and "The Association for Special Children and Families" in West Milford, along with all the Chapters of the Autism Society of America, have dedicated years of service in their ongoing efforts to advocate for the rights, humane treatment, and appropriate education of all persons with Autism; and

WHEREAS, these groups remain committed to their cause and to educating families, professionals, and the general public to better understand this lifelong disability; and

WHEREAS, Autism is a complex disability that requires increased research to one day find a cure and prevention, and greater recognition and understanding to ensure that individuals with Autism living in West Milford and all other Americans with Autism are accurately diagnosed and appropriately treated throughout their lives.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOSEPH A. DiDONATO, Mayor of the Township of West Milford, on behalf of the Township of West Milford Town Council and residents of the Township of West Milford, do hereby proclaim the month of April 2006 as

NATIONAL AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH

in the Township of West Milford, County of Passaic, New Jersey.

Mr. Cibenko thanked the community, the Mayor and the Council for their support. He noted that it means a lot to those families who are afflicted with such needs. The audience applauded.

Council President Gervens noted that the second proclamation is for National Library Worker's Day. He invited representatives from the Township's Library Board to come forward to accept this proclamation.

- Proclamation -

National Library Workers Day

WHEREAS, the staff of the West Milford Township Library provides excellent and invaluable service to library users in our community regardless of age, ethnicity, or socioeconomic background; and

WHEREAS, the library provides residents with the knowledge and information they need to live, learn and work in the 21st Century; and

WHEREAS, the librarians and library support staff bring a world of knowledge in person and online, as well as personal service and expert assistance in finding what is needed when it is needed; and

WHEREAS, it is important to recognize the unique contributions of all library workers and the value to individuals and society of those contributions; and

WHEREAS, librarians and other library workers must be brought to the table at public policy discussions on key issues, such as intellectual freedom, equity of access, and narrowing the digital divide; and

WHEREAS, libraries, library workers, and library supporters across America are celebrating National Library Workers Day sponsored by the American Library Association-Allied Professional Association (ALA-APA).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that I, Joseph A. DiDonato, Mayor of the Township of West Milford, in the County of Passaic, New Jersey do hereby proclaim Tuesday, April 4, 2006 as

"National Library Workers Day"

I encourage all in this community to take advantage of the variety of library resources available and to thank library workers for their exceptional contributions to American life.

The Library Board President, Gene Valenta, thanked the Mayor and Council on behalf of the Library Board of Trustees. He also thanked the entire library team for their hard work. He noted that the new librarian, Pat Hannan, is doing a great job. The audience applauded.

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Unfinished Business, Final Passage of Ordinances

None.

Public Comments

Council President Gervens opened the meeting to the public.

Tim Barnes stated that he is a pastor at a local church. He advised that six local churches are engaged in a collaboration to benefit the community. They are presenting a drama titled *The Living Last Supper* which is a reenactment of the last supper and is a great production. He advised that it is the combination of talent, funding, and resources from the six churches involved and 100% of the proceeds will go toward the restoration of the Creative Playground. The tickets will cost \$5 in advance and \$7 at the door. *The Living Last Supper* will be presented on Friday April 14, 2006 at the West Milford High School. Pastor Barnes offered the Council complimentary tickets to this event. Council President Gervens advised that the Council will make those tickets available to those persons in the community less fortunate than they and the Council will purchase tickets as needed. Pastor Barnes advised that tickets can be purchased by calling 973-728-4300. Marilyn Lichtenberg thanked Pastor Barnes and all the congregations on behalf of the Creative Playground Committee.

Ada Erik, 1643 Macopin Road, West Milford thanked the Council for pushing for enforcement of the helmet law. She advised that the grits have not been swept from the bikeway on Ridge Road and this is causing a safety hazard for bicyclists. Ms. Erik introduced Master Brian Eckelberger who is ten years old and the newest volunteer in West Milford. Last week, Brian counted the number of houses on his street and he also counted the number of houses on this street that have house numbers. There are 74 houses on his street and 7 of these have house numbers displayed. To thank Brian for his altruistic endeavors, Ms. Erik presented his and his two sisters with a gift certificate to *Town Cycle* to get fitted for bicycle helmets. She advised that it was decided at the Blood Drive last week that those involved in the blood drive will start collecting used bicycle helmets, have them repaired, and will distribute them to kids who do not have helmets.

Elaine Young-Duffy, 24 Greenbrook Drive, West Milford advised that she has learned that the Tichenor House is not being considered for future State or Federal designation as an historic landmark. She advised that, in her opinion, this has been a political football which has caused frustration to the *Friends of the Tichenor House*. They now plan to take matters into their own hands to raise funds for the necessary restoration of this historic property. She will act as a liaison. The first priority will be to repair the roof. They will establish an e-mail and membership campaign seeking donations and contributions. She presented a number of possible scenarios for the use of this house.

Frank Hannan, 83 Krattiger Court, West Milford thanked Congressman Garrett and Councilman Scangarello for their work to get grant money for West Milford. He noted that he recently read an article in the *Trends* about a proposed water tax. He opined that the proposed state tax provides a high tax for preservation but no tax relief for the town. He urged the Council to send a message to the state expressing that tax relief should be a priority. The state is proposing using the generated revenue for infrastructure which means that tax funds will be used by Newark so that they can use our water to make a profit.

Martin O'Shea, 22 Greenbrook Drive, West Milford stated that fees for Bubbling Springs are raised every year. Successive councils have forgotten that these are taxes and that the government has a responsibility to provide services. He questioned why the Council would consider charging a penalty to anyone who loses a badge. He asked that the Township analyze the recreation fees. He stated that the action items on the agenda tonight do not provide sufficient description to the public. He also stated that the Township should give all information to the reporters so that we get better news coverage.

Bob Pawlo, 7 Madelyn Avenue, West Milford stated that the Tichenor House was built in 1754 and is a pre-revolutionary war structure. The property has been abused for decades. He stated that he attended Saturday's joint meeting with the Board of Education where the Wallisch property was discussed. He has know this property all his life and recalls that Mr. Wallisch often said that the property would be preserved for the residents for all times. He stated that the

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Wallisch property is a recharging area for drinking water and that when the Wallisch estates built four houses some years ago it had a negative impact on the well water in that area. Nothing, he said, can be built on the Wallisch property. All the properties in that area are wetlands and swamp. He stated that something has to be done to protect the Wallisch property and its intended use was for kids and education.

Marilyn Lichtenberg, 37 Hudson Street (Lindy's Lake), West Milford stated that the lake communities in town charge fees for the use of facilities. People who do not belong to a lake community use Bubbling Springs. By comparison to the fees charged by private lake communities, Bubbling Springs fees are very reasonable and the services are great.

Paul Bailey, 1349 Macopin Road, West Milford asked everyone to consider what they are doing here today. He stated that it is in the best interest of this community to end personal attacks. Debates can take place in Town Hall and those involved in such debate should leave the building as friends. He asked that tonight mark the end of bullying tactics. He stated that mayors, councilmen, and commissioners should all rise above this behavior and become positive role models.

Thomas McCann, West Milford stated that he is a long time resident and business owner. He stated that he provided information for distribution to the Council relative to his property off Canistear Road. He stated that this property was intended for development. Then, along came the Highlands Act. He stated that this property lends itself to open space and he was approached by green acres in this vein. Prior to Highlands, the State valued this property at \$1.4 million; after the Highlands Act was passed they offered him \$400,000. He asked the Council members to visit his property to see that it is suitable for open space. He advised that he intends to ask the County to match the State's \$400,000 offer and he asked the Council to consider matching the \$400,000 also. He stated that this property should be open space that can be used by all the residents in this town. He advised that this property could satisfy everyone's needs; recreation, trails, ball fields, hiking, cross-country skiing, etc. He cannot afford to accept the State's offer and wants the Council to help make the offer reasonable so that he can obtain a price comparable to the value placed on this property before the Highlands Act. He stated that he pays taxes in excess of \$81,000 to West Milford each year. He thanked the Council for listening to him tonight.

Kathleen Caren, 16 Quince Tree Lane, West Milford stated that she is here tonight as a private citizen. She advised that the Highlands Council will be hosting a forum in Chester from 6-9 p.m. on April 5th. She reviewed the agenda. She stated that the recent advances on the Jungle Habitat property are a wonderful outcome for West Milford and this region and she congratulated the Council on this. She advised that any plans for this site will need Highlands and DEP approvals. She stated that the recreation programs in this town are great; they minimize obesity and have a positive impact on childhood health. She stated that our taxes will not continue to rise because we will not continue to build and will not have a need for additional services as a result of the Highlands legislation. She will gladly pay higher taxes to have clean air and the ability to walk in the woods. She stated that, in her opinion, our taxes will stabilize and that the Pinelands is proof of that. She stated that the State is not getting funds from the Federal government and she asked that the Council urge the President to roll back the tax breaks to the wealthy.

Patty Lotz-Moore, 1292 Westbrook Road, West Milford stated that everyone has a right to voice opinions. She stated that ratables do decrease taxes for residents. Our President should not be brought up in this forum; we are here to discuss the town and what we are going to do for the residents of this town. She thanked Congressman Garrett for the money he brought back to this town. She asked the Council to continue recognizing the benefits of the Historic Preservation Commission. She congratulated those people who work with and advocate for autistic children.

Gregor Siratoff, Warwick, New York stated that our President should be brought up in this forum if any person wants to broach the subject. Anything can be said in here about our country because this is a democracy.

Arthur McQuaid, 31 Morsetown Road, West Milford thanked the Council for affording him this time to speak. He noted that Councilman Weisbecker appeared in last week's newspaper while out on the jobsite at Deadman's Curve; Councilman Scangarello was commended in yesterday's paper for the efforts he has made for this town. He noted that the Council is currently working on the budget and he knows that they are attempting to keep taxes low. He stated that it is okay to have user's pay for services they use such as the services at Bubbling Springs. He is glad that the Council understands that the taxes are citizen's money. He stated that the Highlands Act stole many people's retirement and equated that to any entity stealing a 401K plan. Noting that

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the government does not have the right to take away people's property and future, he asked for support for a proposed bill that would rescind the Highlands Act.

Councilman Weisbecker moved to close the Public Comments portion of the meeting at 8:44 p.m.

Council Comments

Councilman Weisbecker congratulated Ada Erik on a great job and welcomed Brian as the newest volunteer in West Milford. He stated that the water tax is a travesty noting that watershed communities are not receiving any relief. He asked for Council consensus for a resolution to be sent to Governor Corzine asking for such relief. Councilman Nolan stated that it might be better to ask our representatives in the twenty-sixth district to arrange a meeting and then petition them to lobby in Trenton for us to get such relief. Councilman Weisbecker agreed but asked for the resolution also. Council President Gervens stated that it would be wise to let our neighboring communities know our plans and determine if they would like to lobby with us. The Council gave consensus for a resolution endorsing that water tax funds be used for property tax relief. Councilman Weisbecker addressed Mr. Bailey and advised him that this dais has been very active and productive lately. He noted that the Council members are working well as a unit for West Milford. He stated that Mr. McCann's property is beautiful and stated that it may be possible that it is suited for open space. He asked the Council to direct the environmental commission to look at the property and report back to the Council. The Council gave consensus and instructed the Administrator likewise. Councilman Weisbecker stated that he would like to see the open space committee resurrected. He stated that the Council is attempting to keep taxes in check.

Councilman Warden arrived at the meeting at 8:51 p.m.

He reviewed some budget discussions. He stated that the Highlands Act was rushed through without consideration of funding to those municipalities most affected. Since 1996, our state aid has been reduced by \$800,000. The Pinelands communities were destroyed by what happened in that part of the state and the watershed communities should have been included in the Highlands process from the beginning.

Councilman Smolinski stated that he walked the McCann property today and it is beautiful. He stated that the McCann family has been in West Milford for a long time and they have contributed a lot to this community; we owe them any assistance we can provide. He noted, in response to Ms. Caren's earlier comments, that there is no proposed school construction, we have volunteer fire and ambulance and yet taxes continue to rise with no end in sight. The county and state continue to increase their taxes and we have no control. He stated that we need to go to Trenton and oppose the proposed state budget because West Milford is always forgotten. He noted that the Governor made comments last night that contradict the statements he made during his campaign. When the water tax was first proposed, there was no talk using the funds for infrastructure. The Highlands Act has negatively impacted our property values; we are the guardians of this watershed and we are not getting the needed financial help.

Council President Gervens echoed what has already been said about the water tax. He stated that the Council must act, have the attorney draft a resolution, and plan a meeting with our representatives.

Councilman Nolan advised Ms. Duffy that she has his support with her efforts for the Tichenor House and he believes that he can confidently say that she has Mr. Warden's support also. He thanked Mr. Siratoff from Warwick; people should be free to speak their minds. He stated that he supports the Highlands Act and noted that Riverdale is turning into Paramus as far as traffic is concerned. He noted that, while we do need tax relief, we cannot build and build and build. He does not want to see West Milford subjected to the traffic congestion that is plaguing many other parts of this state. In response to the user fees, Mr. Nolan noted that we charge for copies of documents requested under OPRA, noted the fee schedule and advised that we collected less than \$400 last year.

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Councilman Warden apologized for his lateness tonight. He stated that without the Highlands Act, we would have four hundred more homes in town which would necessitate the construction of more schools. We would now be facing even higher taxes. He stated that there is a problem with the current system; all seven elected officials should get angry and go to Trenton to fight for relief from the water tax. We are the guardians of the water supply and Trenton should compensate us for that.

Councilman Scangarello stated that his fellow Councilmen adequately expressed his sentiments. Newark is flourishing; they are making money from our water and we are charged with protecting that water for them. In return, we are getting nothing. He stated that Mr. Bailey's words did not fall on deaf ears and he thanked him. He thanked Ada and welcomed West Milford's newest volunteer. He thanked Congressman Garrett for his assistance with the streetscape grant. He stated that it was a pleasure working with the Congressman and his staff and he is looking forward to working with him on obtaining a grant for Upper Greenwood Lake.

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND SUPPLEMENT
'THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST MILFORD
1976, AS AMENDED', CHAPTER XXIV FEES AND COSTS
(PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT FEES)**

WHEREAS, the Township Council has determined that various fees and costs currently imposed by the Township do not adequately defray the expense incurred by the Township in performing services relating thereto; and the Township Council has reviewed all Township fees and costs and adjusted the same to reasonably reflect present expenses; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED that the 'Revised General Ordinances of the Township of West Milford, 1976, as Amended' are hereby further amended as follows:

Section 24-2 Fees.

Section 24-2.1 The Department of Parks and Recreation is authorized to charge the following fees.

A. Bubbling Springs Membership and Badge:

- 1. Family - consists of parent(s) and all children up to and including full-time students living at home - \$205.00
- 2. Individual - a person age thirteen (13) through sixty-one (61) - \$ 90.00.
- 3. Senior Citizen - a person age sixty-two (62) or over - \$ 15.00
Senior Couple - persons age sixty-two (62) or over - \$ 25.00
- 4. Late Fee – add'l fee added to membership fee after the June deadline of each year - \$ 15.00
- 5. Lost Badge - \$ 10.00 each

B. West Milford Parks Guest Membership (per person):

- A person under five (5) years of age - \$ 3.00
- A person from five (5) years to fifteen (15) years of age - \$ 4.00
- A person from sixteen (16) years to sixty-one (61) years of age - \$ 10.00
- Seniors (Age 62+) \$2.00

C. Tennis Programs:

Councilman Weisbecker made a motion to have this resolution placed on the floor for discussion. Councilman Smolinski seconded the motion.

Discussion: Councilman Nolan stated that, with all the recent budget meetings, this resolution should have been discussed with Council. He noted that we may have to lay people off and yet the temporary budget includes an appropriation for tourism. This temporary budget also shows increased numbers for the pension contributions and those numbers do not match the bill list.

Councilman Weisbecker made a motion to have this resolution tabled until later in the evening. Councilman Smolinski seconded the motion.

Noting that the Administrator had returned to the meeting, Councilman Weisbecker made a motion to readdress Resolution 2006-099. Councilman Smolinski seconded the motion.

Discussion: Councilman Nolan stated that the temporary budget reflects pension payments to PERC and PFRS in amounts that are different to those reflected on the bill list. If we approve this temporary budget, we cannot pay the bills as reflected on the bill list or we will exceed the temporary budget appropriations. He asked why the temporary budget has an appropriation for tourism when this is an on-going discussion with Council that has not been resolved. Administrator Kunze advised that the temporary budget is based on a percentage of last year's budget and that the resolution being presented tonight is less than the amount allowed by law. The temporary budget does not affect budget decisions. Individual items can be changed as the

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Council sees fit. Administrator Kunze advised that he will have to seek clarification on the pension amounts from the CFO; he asked the Council to proceed with the resolution tonight, amending it to include the increased amount. He also advised that the tourism appropriation can also be removed through an amendment tonight. Councilman Nolan recommended amending the resolution to appropriate \$430,000 to the PFRS as opposed to the \$425,000 reflected in the temporary budget, increase the appropriation for PERS from \$135,000 to \$140,000 and remove the \$6,000 appropriated to tourism for a net increase to the temporary budget of \$14,000 bringing the total to \$12,372,507.

Councilman Weisbecker made a motion to amend resolution 2006-099 pursuant to the recommendations made by Councilman Nolan.

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vendor to cease work. Councilman Warden stated that he believes that this expenditure made simply because the funds were appropriated for tourism. He stated that he is opposed to this and cannot condone spending \$12,000 on tourism when we may have to lay people off; it is an ill-conceived concept. He suggested taking the \$12,000 to hire a lobbyist to go to Trenton to lobby for tax relief through the water tax. Councilman Scangarello noted that, failure to pay the bill could ultimately cost the Township much more in legal fees. He supports further discussion at the next workshop meeting.

Administrator Kunze asked the Council if they had made a decision as to whether or not we should apply for extraordinary aid. Councilman Nolan stated that \$43 million was appropriated for extraordinary aid in the 2006 State budget; this year's budget is proposing an appropriation of \$30 million. He believes we will not qualify. The Council agreed and the consensus was that the Township of West Milford will not apply for extraordinary aid this year.

Councilman Weisbecker stated that a member of the Greenwood Lake Bi-State Commission is resigning. He advised that the Beautification and Recycling Commission has found that bear resistant garbage cans are successful. He noted that the SLAP crew has been cleaning in a number of areas in town. He requested that the Council consider adopting an ordinance requiring use of clear garbage bags. He also encouraged local businesses to bring their paper to our recycling center. He noted that the planning board is scheduled to meet tomorrow night and he will report back to the Council. He provided an overview of a seminar he attended on pay-to-play and noted that he and Councilman Nolan plan to attend another seminar on this topic. He provided a brief comparison of the fair and open process versus the non-fair and open process and noted that there is a lot of confusion surrounding this legislation. Municipalities that have adopted pay-to-play ordinances have been required to amend those ordinances repeatedly to conform to the ever-changing state statute.

Councilman Smolinski noted that, while the weather remains somewhat chilly, the bears are out of hibernation. He cautioned residents about telephone scams and advised that some residents have been receiving calls from an entity claiming to be the NJ Rebate Program. He advised that the NJ Rebate Program does not make such telephone contact with residents. He would like to see the Police Chief engage in educational initiatives for residents telling them about such scams.

Council President Gervens had no report.

Councilman Nolan advised that the Heritage Committee will be showcasing a collection of 9 prints that will be housed in their new home at the museum henceforth. The exhibit will be on April 1st and 2nd from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m. He provided a brief overview of the artist's life and works. He advised that the Heritage Committee's annual tennis tournament is scheduled for May 20th and 21st. This is the thirteenth year for this annual fundraiser and this year it is dedicated to the memory of Bob Baker who past away last year. The Heritage Committee is seeking sponsors and interested parties can contact Tonya Cubby. He congratulated Councilman Scangarello on the press coverage in Tuesday's Record about the Jungle Habitat property. He noted that Commissioner Bailey requested tonight that the Council consider bygones to be bygones. However, he noted that Mr. Elcavage continues to sit on the MUA and he wants him removed because he is Democat. He advised that he attended the Saint Patrick's Day parade in New York City last week and he congratulated the West Milford High School Band for a job well done.

Councilman Warden stated that the Bi-State Commission is scheduled to sign the weed harvesting agreement tonight. He advised that Mr. Dombrowski is resigning from the commission because he has other commitments. He stated that Richard Dykes is interested in being appointment. He advised that the weed harvester is being prepared and will be in the water by April 15th. He advised that a dinner will be held on April 22nd to acknowledge a number of people throughout the State including Bradley Campbell. He advised that Doris Aaronson, a notable West Milford resident, is being honored at that dinner for her efforts to save the Eagle Ridge property from development. He would like to see the Council recognize Ms. Aaronson for her work and her assistance with legal issues. He advised that more news will be forthcoming on the fleeing investigation. He cannot elaborate at this time. We urged the Council to remove Mr. Elcavage from all committees and boards in Town.

Councilman Scangarello stated that he is seeking donations and volunteers for Jungle Habitat. He referenced a March 10th article in the AIM written by Kathleen Caren of the Passaic County Open Space Council. He advised that the article was addressed to him and that Ms. Caren expressed consternation that the elected officials in West Milford asked questions about the use of open space funds. He stated that, as he understands the role of elected officials, it is their job to ask questions. Eagle Ridge is a high priority for West Milford and, to reiterate Councilman

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Warden's sentiments, we do not want improper name-calling or attacks. This article came from a County employee who called Councilman Scangarello prejudiced in the article. He stated that Ms. Caren does not know anything about him and advised that he is not prejudiced. She has no right to make such statements, especially given her position as a County employee. He stated that he demands an apology from Kathleen Caren.

Report of Township Clerk

The Township Clerk asked if the Council had any questions with regard to her memo. There being no questions, the Clerk had no further report.

Report of Township Attorney

Township Attorney Fred Semrau referred the Council to the chart pertaining to pay-to-play distributed by Councilman Weisbecker and noted that there is no limit on contributions if you award through fair and open. He directed the Council to a letter in their packets dated March 10th in reference to a small tax appeal for 40 Old Route 23. He asked the Council for approval to move a resolution on this matter for consideration on April 5th. The Council granted consensus. Mr. Semrau advised that the remediation in the Farrell Field matter was not completed because the Contractor failed to complete the work. He has put \$15,000 in trust and the report for recreation is that the field is nowhere near completion and the work that has been done is substandard. Mr. Semrau recommended that, if the work is not completed by the end of April, we should file suit. He provided a summary of the lease for Jungle Habitat and noted that this item will be scheduled for more in-depth discussion at a future workshop meeting. He advised that the weed harvester agreement has been sent out for signature to the County and the Commission. He further advised that he is pursuing Tilcon for breach of contract for their failure to provide snow removal product pursuant to their contract. The Township engineer has calculated our damages to be \$16,000. He advised that the Council is required to appoint a Chief Municipal Public Defender and that this discussion will be scheduled for a workshop agenda.
