**Presentations**

Liquor License Transfer – Person-to-Person, Murapaul Corp. t/a Island of Spirits to Hplay West Milford Liquors, LLC – the municipal clerk directed the Council to a memo in their packet advising that all approvals have been obtained and this application was found to be complete and in order. Bennett Wassertom Esq. addressed the Council advising that he represents the proposed new owner of this license, Mrs. Patel. Mrs. Patel also addressed the Council advising that she has been a business woman for fifteen years and she provided details of some of her business ventures. She proposes to continue to operate this business as it has been run in the past and is committed to enhancing this community. She plans to install a state of the art security system to identify any underage person wishing to purchase goods in her establishment.

Green Team – David Watson-Hallowell addressed the Council from the podium and distributed a PowerPoint presentation for their edification. Mr. Watson-Hallowell provided a definition of what a sustainable community is and he stated that we cannot continue to live as we have been without compromising the ability of future generations to survive. He stated that Sustainable Jersey is a certification and incentive program for municipalities in New Jersey which promotes balancing the need to take care of the environment with economic concerns and the needs of society. For most people, this means that we can provide our successors with the same quality of life we now enjoy. He reviewed the history of Sustainable Jersey and advised that Sustainable West Milford is a non-profit organization that has been in existence for four years. He listed the organizations that participate in the Sustainable Jersey program stating that the goal of the program is to go green, save money and sustain quality of life in the long term. The program gives direction to municipalities on how to become sustainable and communities that are certified have greater access to grants both from private sources and those sponsored by the State of New Jersey. He reviewed some sustainable actions already taken by Sustainable West Milford to qualify for this program and stated that the formation of a green team is mandatory for those communities who wish to receive such certification. He listed some of the municipal

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priority actions that would be required for sustainable action. He stated that the proposed green team is strictly an advisory committee and is a subcommittee of the Environmental Commission. He stated that the model resolution was chosen specifically to allow for community representation and participation without need of appointment. He stated that the green team needs the support and endorsement of the Township Council to make larger projects a reality.

Council President Smolinski stated that there appears to be a communication breakdown in this matter. The Council should know the exact goals of the committee and the related impact to the community. Councilman Jurkovic agreed adding that the proposed water ordinance is part of a greater plan, something he learned by visiting the Sustainable Jersey website. While he supports some of the initiatives listed on this website, others are of concern. However, these initiatives and priorities have not been discussed with the Council and he would like an opportunity to sit with Mr. Watson-Hallowell to go through the list, understand the team's goals, give input from the Council and understand the entire plan.

Mr. Watson-Hallowell stated that the team's goal is to obtain bronze certification this year but they need the Council's endorsement by virtue of this resolution to achieve that goal. The team proposes to apply for a \$25,000 grant from Sustainable New Jersey to educate residents about sustainable building techniques. Councilman Jurkovic commended the team's dedication but lamented that they have not provided the Council with the overall plan. Councilman Nolan asked Mr. Watson-Hallowell to provide the Clerk's office with a schedule of proposed meetings as well as copies of the meeting minutes on a regular basis. Councilman Weisbecker stated that he would like to receive input from the Environmental Commission prior to the Council taking formal action on a resolution which proposes to endorse a subcommittee of that body. Mr. Watson-Hallowell stated that he will ask the Environmental Commission Chair person, Steve Sangle, to send a memorandum to the Township Administrator for distribution to the Governing Body. In response to Councilman Ramaglia, Mr. Watson-Hallowell stated that he has experienced frustration with efforts to have a water restriction ordinance adopted. He explained how that proposed legislation evolved advising that the green team supported the concept. They thought the water conservation ordinance was reasonable, not cumbersome or draconian. Councilman Jurkovic stated that the Council merely seeks to be kept informed. They did not know that the water conservation ordinance had been distributed to so many groups. It was submitted to Council after it had been widely circulated and the Council was not aware that such detailed effort had been vested into legislation that was never broached with the elected officials. However, after the fact and by doing his own research online, he learned that the green team would be eligible to earn additional credits if the Township had adopted a water conservation ordinance. Because ordinances are legal documents, the Governing Body has an obligation to ensure that such proposed legislation includes definitions. The ordinance placed before the Council had a number of deficiencies. Mr. Watson-Hallowell stated that the resolution supporting the green team does not compel the municipality to any commitments and will not incur any costs.

The Council thanked Mr. Watson-Hallowell for attending tonight's meeting.

Shared Services – Mr. Roger Staib, Government Strategy Group addressed the Council. Mr. Staib advised that his firm has received a contract through Passaic County and funded by the State of New Jersey to facilitate shared services throughout the state. He advised that this is a grant process emanating from the Department of Community Affairs which resulted in a competitive bidding process administered through Passaic County. The State has awarded \$98,000 for this one-year contract. The objective of this grant initiative is to reduce costs without cutting efficiency. His contract requires him to initiate discussions with various public entities to foster alternatives to current methods of conducting business. His firm will act as a facilitator rather than to give direction. He stated that shared services provides cost saving opportunities and host opportunities when an entity has the means to be the lead agency in a shared services situation. He has been working to determine if there are services that can be provided to municipal entities by County government. He commended Administrator Boyle for helping him develop thoughts and he has had three regional meetings across Passaic County where he received a lot of input and ideas were shared. As a result, he is preparing an efficiency study which will be completed by public entities to qualify and quantify all the information gathered. The next step will be to assess the needs of specific communities, adjacent communities, county and school districts. He will seek to schedule workshop discussions with business administrators and will request consideration of a commodities sale resolution to facilitate the purchase of certain supplies. He stated that many municipalities, in the past and under other grant initiatives, have conducted court and dispatch merger studies. He stated that his company has the templates for such studies.

Public Comments

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Mayor Bieri opened the meeting to the public after advising that there is a five-minute limit for each speaker.

Renee Alessio, Upper Greenwood Lake stated that she is happy to hear the Council discuss a water conservation ordinance which is legislation she supports. She stated that current weather conditions and the long term forecast warrant such an ordinance. Already, certain municipalities are restricting water usage and the DEP is urging conservation. The West Milford MUA was instructed by the DEP that their users must restrict outside water usage. She asked if the Township will be issuing an advisory. She asked for Council support for the sustainable Wal-Mart grant. She expressed concern about the Tennessee Gas Line project that is currently underway in Ringwood and coming through West Milford.

Wendy Watson-Hallowell, Upper Greenwood Lake thanked and commended Mayor Bieri for her efforts to successfully lobby for restoration of watershed aid to West Milford.

There being no more comments from the public Councilman Nolan moved to close the public portion of the meeting.

**Council Comments**

Councilman Jurkovic stated that the DEP website breaks various water sources down by category. The DEP is more concerned with the length of time people utilize water sprinklers than the time of day they are utilized.

Council President Smolinski stated that he received a reverse-911 call from the Sheriff's office about water restrictions and it made no mention of the MUA. Ridgewood, he said, has banned all outside watering. He asked if West Milford will be utilizing reverse-911 to educate residents.

Mayor Bieri stated that West Milford had 100% of the watershed aid restored and she thanked the legislators who made that decision after hearing the message. She stated that it was interesting to attend those hearings and learn about the multiple issues facing New Jersey municipalities.

**Discussion Items**

1)	League Discussion Items – Administrator Boyle directed the Council to a memo from the Township Attorney in 2009 with a list of possible topics for NJLM consideration. Councilman Nolan received consensus to have each Council member review the list, ranking the top four discussion items and advising the Administrator of each ranking. He further requested that this ranking be discussed at the next workshop meeting.
2)	Green Energy Subcommittee – Councilman Jurkovic stated that he has been discussing and contemplating the practicality of green energy initiatives in town and he has talked about solar and wind energy. There are companies that rent land for such uses and he would like the Council to establish a committee to identify municipal property, if it exists, that could be put to such use. This would generate revenue for West Milford and promote the concept of green energy. Councilman Weisbecker asked that the Environmental Commission be afforded an opportunity to weigh in on the matter and Councilman Nolan requested that staff be directed to review, comment and report back to Council on this topic. The Council agreed with all requests and asked Administrator Boyle to have responses from staff and the Environmental Commission at the September workshop meeting.
3)	NJ League of Municipality Position on Governor's Cap – Administrator Boyle asked that this discussion be deferred to a later workshop because the information is constantly changing and being updated. The Council agreed.
4)	604(b) Sampling Scope of Work – Administrator Boyle advised that he is seeking consensus to present Council with a resolution at the next meeting to allow Princeton Hydro to proceed with the initial phase of a project which will ultimately result in the installation of monitoring wells on Township property at Greenwood Lake and Belchers Creek. The DEP has worked closely with the Township of this program and we will seek additional grant money throughout the various phases of this project. The Council gave consensus to proceed.
5)	Tennessee Gas Pipeline (TGP) Easements – Administrator Boyle stated that TGP has requested to increase the size of their current easements on the Wallisch property. He is

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	awaiting receipt of environmental information from them and asked that this discussion be deferred to a future date. The proposed expansion of the existing easement would not affect vegetation or the Ramapo mitigation project. While he does not recall how much TGP offered to pay the Township, he advised that the Tax Assessor has opined that the offer is reasonable and the Township Attorney added that this amount can be negotiated.
6)	Greenwood Lake Commission / Letter of 6/15/10 – Administrator Boyle advised that the Greenwood Lake Bi-State Commission has sent a letter regarding the proposed drawdown of the lake and they have indicated that they will view a non-response as no objection. Councilman Weisbecker asked if any mention has been made about an access bridge to Storms Island. Mr. Boyle advised that they are awaiting approval and funding from the DEP and Councilman Weisbecker cautioned that the residents of Storms Island need an answer. Mr. Semrau stated that the Commission is seeking affirmative action from the Council and, as such, the Council may need a professional opinion. The Council instructed Mr. Boyle to advise that Commission that they need additional time, at least until after the July 21 <sup>st</sup> Council meeting and they further instructed him to obtain an opinion from Princeton Hydro on this matter.
7)	Ordinance – Wind Energy – Mr. Semrau advised that this proposed legislation was initiated by the Planning Board with input from the Environmental Commission. He drafted this ordinance to be consistent with the goals of the forthcoming master plan and to that end he conferred with the Township Planner, Chuck McGroarty. The Planning Board does not want to see such uses in residential areas but would rather see initial projects located in commercial zones. Anyone wishing to install a wind energy system in a residential zone would have to seek a zoning waiver and, if the ordinance is adopted, the Zoning Board would have the authority to grant a variance. Councilman Jurkovic stated that he spent a lot of time this past weekend researching wind towers and he will forward his research to the Township Administrator. With that in mind, he asked that this discussion be deferred to a future workshop when the Council will have the benefit of that information. The Council agreed.
8)	Ordinance – Accept Sidewalk Easement Block 6303 Lot 18 – Administrator Boyle recalled that this matter was placed on a prior agenda at which time the Council sought additional information. He directed them to a memorandum from the Attorney’s office and the Council gave consensus to proceed to introduction at the next meeting.
9)	<del>Ordinance – Lawn Watering -</del>
10)	Resolution – Temporary Budget – Mr. Boyle stated that watershed aid has been restored and as a result he has scheduled meeting with the Township Auditor to work on the budget which he hopes to have ready for adoption on August 4 <sup>th</sup> . He asked that the Council direct any questions to him before the next meeting at which time he will seek Council approval of the budget. Mayor Bieri asked about funding for a new police officer and terminal pay for retirees. Mr. Boyle advised that he will have the CFO provide detailed information about those matters.
11)	Resolution – ANJEC Grant and Source of Matching Funds – Administrator Boyle advised that the Township generally maintains an account to fund matching contributions for grant applications. However, those funds were not allocated in the municipal budget and the Environmental Commission is seeking permission to utilize open space funds to apply for an ANJEC grant which requires matching funds. Mr. Semrau advised that this would require a resolution authorizing the submission of the grant application which resolution would dictate the source of funding to be allocated for this purpose.
12)	Resolution – Deferred Compensation Plan Amendments – the Council gave consensus to proceed with a resolution for the next meeting.
13)	Resolution – Treatment Works Approval (TWA) Block 15803 Lot 4 – Mr. Semrau advised that the Health Department advised him in June that this property requires a TWA application requiring governing body consent to be processed by the DEP. He has reviewed the parameters of the application and this is not an expansion of use. Once a system exceeds usage of 2,000 gallons per day the property owner must seek DEP approval for the system. The Health Director is recommending that the Council approve this application and he has certified that everything else is in order. The property owner’s attorney and engineer were invited to address the Council and Otto Blasek, Esq. spoke on behalf of the Mrs. Nicholson. He advised that his client has been waiting for about three years to rent a unit from which she evicted a massage parlor. She has complied with all requirements and requests from Township officials. It took considerable time to proceed through the processes at the planning and zoning boards. Mrs. Nicholson’s engineer, Douglas McKittrick, advised that there are two buildings on this property. He stated that the DEP, through the administrative code, allocates gallonage based on use of the building and they have calculated the usage to be 2,407 gallons per day. Thus the need for this permit application. The current system is comprised of three cesspools which will be converted to an updated septic system with tanks and fields and will be located 63’ from the well on the property. The DEP requires Council consent to approve the application although such consent does not constitute approval of the plans just the submission of the application.
14)	Resolution – Settle Tax Appeals – Mr. Semrau advised that he has prepared a resolution authorizing the settlement of certain residential appeals based on the recommendation of the

Discussion: Councilman Nolan stated that Labor Counsel is being paid over \$12,000, a large portion of which is to compensate for work done on the layoff plan. He asked Administrator Boyle if there are sufficient appropriations for legal costs in the municipal budget. Mr. Boyle stated that approximately 50% of the funds appropriated for legal services have been expended and he believes that there is sufficient funding to see the municipality through the remainder of the year. Councilman Nolan stated that this is an example of why there is a need for civil service reform and he stated that the Council must make provisions for these expenditures especially if the legislature is going to enact a CAP. Mr. Boyle stated that he monitors expenditures to ensure that we do not exceed appropriations.

**Reports of Mayor, Administrator, Council Members, Attorney and Clerk**

Councilman Weisbecker stated that information distributed to Council in their packets would indicate that feral cats are killing endangered species of other wild animals. He questioned if the Township's

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ordinance will be superseded if the Department of Fish & Wildlife proposes a resolution. He stated that the Township's code authorizes the Mayor to declare a state of emergency to limit water use and he asked Mr. Semrau to provide a legal opinion as to that section of the code. Mr. Semrau advised that Township ordinances do provide for certain restrictions when there are drought conditions. Such an emergency can be declared by the MUA, resolution of the Township Council or a proclamation from the Mayor. Councilman Weisbecker expressed concern that declaring such an emergency would affect persons simply watering plants. Mr. Semrau advised that the Council could designate authority to the Township Administrator to take action as necessary based on input from staff and professionals. Councilman Ramaglia recommended preparing a notification to be delivered to residents via a reverse 911 telephone message and delegate authority to Administrator Boyle to declare an emergency if necessary. Councilman Weisbecker made a motion to that effect.

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Councilman Weisbecker asked Administrator Boyle why the Passaic County Sheriff is promulgating messages about Thunder in the Highlands which is a local event. Mr. Boyle advised that the reverse 911 system is administered by the Passaic County Sheriff's office. The Township submits a request to the Sheriff and they take it from there. The Township is not billed for this service which is funded by virtue of drug-confiscated funds. Councilman Weisbecker asked Mr. Boyle for a status report on the proposed town center project and he asked Administrator Boyle if the Township has utilized all federal funds granted toward this project. Mr. Boyle stated that he will contact Dewberry representatives for a status update.

Council President Smolinski asked residents to be mindful of those serving in the United States armed forces as we contemplate our discomfort with temperatures hovering around 100°. Those men and women engage in physical activities in hotter climates without many of the amenities that we take for granted. He thanked them and their families. He noted that the Township Planner, Chuck McGroarty, has advised the Council by memorandum that the Township is not required to update the open space plan. He stated that two weeks ago he toured the Greene property on Wooley Road with about six other people. Everyone agreed that the Township should move forward with this acquisition. He reiterated that the watershed aid is being restored and he thanked Senator Pennachio and Assemblymen DeCroke & Weber for their efforts.

Councilman Nolan provided an overview of the formation of and the research done by the Telecommunication Committee whose membership recommended that the Township upgrade the telephone system. Township personnel have met with vendors and the Committee met last week at which time they listened to three presentations. They will meet again later this month and make a recommendation to Council. The anticipated savings is approximately \$5,000 per month. He stated that Mayor Bieri sent letters to the professionals hired by the Township requesting financial concessions in light of these tough economic times. He commended Mr. Semrau for making concessions despite the fact that he has not requested an increase since he was hired. He asked Administrator Boyle to request that the Planning and Zoning Boards send out a similar request. He stated that the Township now owns the Random Woods property and he has heard that in certain areas people have cut out openings onto the property and are parking cars there. Mr. Semrau stated that he will look into that matter and added that he will also review the status of the well capping and soil testing.

Councilwoman Lichtenberg stated that the PAL fireworks will be held this Friday night. She listed dates for upcoming concerts in the park to be held at Bubbling Springs and she advised that the library will be hosting a number of free events throughout the summer months.

Mayor Bieri stated that the Random Woods acquisition has been discussed at length and has been heavily publicized. This acquisition is very beneficial to the Township and is in accord with the Governing Body's position that open space acquisitions provide for public recreational benefits. This acquisition will ultimately result in a ball field being constructed either there or at another location in West Milford. She thanked everyone who worked on this acquisition. She listed those professionals who have responded to her request for rate concessions and thanked them for reducing their rates in response to her letter. She asked Mr. Semrau to review the letter recently promulgated by the DEP about feral cats. She interprets the letter as saying that the DEP is not taking a position put rather is simply stating that it is not good to have outdoor cats. They will be hosting informational seminars on this topic. She stated that feral cats do exist and added that the TNR program impacts the feral cat population.

Administrator Boyle stated that the Telecommunications Committee will be making a recommendation as indicated earlier by Councilman Nolan. He commended Brian Jenkins on his efforts in this regard and stated that the Township will likely save substantial dollars as a result.
